All About PEBBLE

As your PEBBLE Rep, I've been asked to write up a report of what it's all about.

So here goes.

For those that don't know, PEBBLE is a network organisation, allowing positive and productive interaction between the growing communities of modern British Pagans and British government departments, bodies and institutions. You can see the minutes of past meetings and find out more at the website www. pebble.uk.net

It's more a "doing" organization than a "voting" one. Namely, if there is something to do with the Census, we, the partner organizations discuss it on the PEBBLE list, and then go out and do whatever is decided. Pebble works more by consensus unless a major vote is needed. The partner organizations cover a large percentage of the various faiths under the Pagan umbrella, and can represent you to the various public bodies.

Things we've done this year are

- Getting Paganism recognized by the Metropolitan Police Faith & Diversity Unit.

- Becoming a formally consulted organization with the Census Office.

- Forming dialogue with the various military chaplaincies for Pagan chaplains.

- Started discussion with the Government about recognized handfastings.

- Successfully had a Pagan Tick Box and "write in" trialed in the latest Census test paper.

These are all things that are too big for one organization to do. We have meetings at governmental level, regarding things that affect Pagans. Admittedly, some groups are better at dealing with certain areas of interest, I'm more expert on the Census, having been involved in the discussions for the past 10 or so years, the PF have a network of Pagan hospital visitors, official prison visitors and Honouring Ancient Dead, who work with the reburial of remains. So although we work parallel lines, by working under the PEBBLE banner, it makes it easier to get recognition for our achievements on a national level, rather than being fractioned into PN, PF, PA, CoBDO etc successes. It promotes a unity.

So how do we decide what we work towards... That's where the members of various organisations come in. If there is something that you want to see discussed, then contact me. I'll then take it to PEBBLE, and we'll see what can be formally done about it.

Anyone can throw something in at any time to the group, we then discuss it and agree a way forward. It would only be something like new member groups we'd formally have to vote on, the rest is usually by consensus. The twice yearly meetings are more of a "status" report back to each other in a formally constituted setting, and to plan our way forward on other campaigns.

So as said - if there is anything you want to see discussed, get in touch, we've had some marvelous successes, and who knows, we could get representation for a cause you want to focus on.

4lbs plums, bullaces, or other autumn fruit 3lbs sugar 1 gallon water pectic enzyme campden tablet yeast yeast nutrient

Bring water to the boil. In the meantime, pick over the fruits, removing any mouldy ones. If using plums or bullaces, remove stones, then place into a fermenting bucket. Lightly crush the fruit then cover with the boiling water.

Add sugar and stir until dissolved. Then add 2 tsp of pectic enzyme (very important as this will stop the must from jellifying). Add a crushed campden tablet to kill any wild yeast left on the fruits, and leave, covered, overnight.

Make up yeast to the instructions on the packet then add to the must. Also add 1 tsp of yeast nutrient, and cover tightly. Leave for 4 days, stirring daily with a plastic spoon.

Strain fruit must into a demijohn using a funnel lined with a double thickness of muslin. Squeeze the fruit to make sure you have all the juice. Do not fill the demijohn higher than the bottom of the neck. Plug lightly with cotton wool and leave for about a day to ensure the fermentation is not too vigorous, then fit demijohn with an airlock. Rack if the sediment becomes thicker than about half an inch, then leave until the fermentation finishes, which will be when there is no more air going through the airlock. Rack into clean sterile bottles and leave for at least 6 months. Enjoy.

Ghostbusters UK are a small group of paranormal investigators, based in Grimsby on the NE Coast of Lincolnshire, headed by Robin Furman, who is known affectionately within the field of Parapsychology as 'The Ghostbuster General' a name coined for him by Lynn Picknett author of Flights of Fancy, 100 years of Paranormal Experiences, A Complete Guide to the Unexplained, and deputy editor on the Unexplained magazine.

He says... "The first ghost I ever saw appeared on the landing of my house in Grimsby about twenty years ago. It's a big, old house in a place known locally as Nun's Corner, because there is a theological history to the site, going back to the eleventh century. I suppose, in view of that, I should not have been surprised to find a ghostly nun in the house.

The first sighting

At the time, Robin was a businessman and had no great interest in the paranormal. Until one evening as he went upstairs he noticed a movement on the landing. At first he thought it might be one of his children - but they were in bed. Continuing up the stairs he suddenly came face to face with a tall nun! She looked completely real, and was wearing an old-fashioned headdress, but where her face should have been was just a glowing light. Rooted to the spot he watched fascinated, as she drifted away and disappeared. It all happened so quickly he says he didn't have time to feel scared; he felt the kind of shock that anyone would have felt seeing a stranger on the landing of their home, but went unexpectedly cold.

Since then the 'ghostly nun' has been seen by his daughter Victoria who saw her once sitting on the end of the bed, when she was sick - and his son Andy who unexpectedly found the nun blocking his exit from the music room, and ran through her to get out! Afterwards he said he felt as though he had passed through a 'fog.' The strange apparition was the start of Robin's interest in the paranormal, but he says he would have laughed at anyone if they had told him then that one day he would be leading possibly one of the first teams of amateur Ghostbusters in the country!

As a mature student, he took his degree in psychology and philosophy at Hull University and then as well as practising hypnotherapy; he began lecturing on psychology, hypnosis and parapsychology at local colleges. The Ghostbusters arose spontaneously from one of these classes, after he was approached by a terrified local woman who, whilst alone in her old cottage one night, was awakened by the sound of rowdy noises coming from the empty bedroom next to hers. When he discussed the case with his class he was surprised that there was an immediate chorus of volunteers to assist him in his research, and eventually seven of them went on their first expedition to that old house.

Robin's interest was in magick and he was fascinated in everything from ancient Egypt to modern parapsychology, and used to write a column in the local newspaper. When the Ghostbusters film was released - the paper coined the name 'The Grimsby Ghostbusters,' which has stuck to this day, and to paraphrase the words from the film-score, there's something strange in everyone's neighbourhood. You'd be surprised how much there is about. Who are the people in Grimsby going to call?

An Introduction to Ghostbusters UK

The New Team:

Over the years as lives change and people move on we now have a different team: -

Robin: still our leader - Psychologist, Author, Parapsychologist, Therapist, and one of the few lecturers on the controversial science of the paranormal in all its different guises. Popular with the media and the public and plays a mean piano! Will always give you a fair hearing with your problems, but don't try to pull the wool over his eyes as he is one of the leading authorities on things that go bump in the night! Has been on countless TV programmes, with the famous, the infamous and the general public, made a host of videos and movies been interviewed by nearly every radio station imaginable, had a series of his own T.V and radio programmes and has a list as long as your arm of newspaper and magazine articles, is a popular 'After Dinner Speaker' and co-authored the book 'Ghosbusters UK' with Moira Martingale, published by 'Hale' in 1991.

Tricia: Woman Friday (me) - researcher, ex nurse, and coordinator of the group - tries to get everyone where they should be on the right day at the right time!!! Not as easy as you think! Has been studying and researching the paranormal for almost 18 years - always asking questions, interviewing worried folk, cataloguing information and loves sitting in cold, uncomfortable places waiting for ghostly sightings. Enjoys spinning webs and built our web site. Just finished typing approx 85,000 words of Robin's new book, taking in the intriguing concept of synaesthesia, now all we need is a publisher!

Tony: Our photographer - there is not much he does not know about photographs and cameras and he can spot a fake at half a mile and has some very weird shots in his own files. He loves his Digi camera but will never give up his beloved 35ml or his special 3D lens and as he does all his own printing and knows how to get the best out of his shots! He gets mad when people try to fake photos and says, "there is just no point, after all we are hear to try to find the answers so why mess up by trying to fake stuff - it's crazy and a complete waste of time".

Sue: Tony's wife, don't know how he does it? Keen and enthusiastic and learning fast, speaks her mind and is an excellent sleuth. Has a knack of putting people at their ease and spotting odd anomalies! Think she would have loved a meeting with Holmes and Watson (who knows - one day) - great at helping by taking notes and keeping everyone warm with steaming mugs of delicious tea and coffee!

Richard: Will turn his hand to anything - is a great driver and stand in camera man, and like the proverbial Mountie always gets his man - Has an extremely dry sense of humour, the patience of Job, very sensitive, loves animals and incredibly quick on the draw - in other words he misses nothing - he may not say so at the time but nothing gets past him! He has been studying parapsychology for almost 20 years and was one of Robin's first pupils, and now his right hand man. Thoughtful and deep with a needle sharp mind.

Michael: Another of our younger members - he is an absolute whiz with sound recordings, he can handle a microphone so well that you hardly know you have been interviewed - very handy with anxious, nervous people, who have probably been steeling themselves for a while whilst trying to decide whether to ask for help - its not easy when you think everyone will think you are either mad or just scoff at your attempts to explain what is happening. He is also a very talented classical guitarist and his mellifluous musicality after a long day ghost watching is soothing to both the body and soul.

Keith: Our final adopted member - a very busy man has written many books on dreaming, especially lucid dreaming, past lives and the effects on the human mind - his 'Dream Machine' invented when he did his PhD, is on permanent show at the Science Museum – he is great at putting people at their ease, and runs a hypnotherapy and past life regression college, travels around the world lecturing and loves catching up with the group when in the area!

Last but by no means least – **Rodney:** One of the 'founder members' of the group - he has traipsed through muddy fields, interviewed countless confused people, taken part in all night sit-ins, explored empty houses and derelict churches in the dead of night, been interviewed and filmed by the media alongside Robin etc.etc..- He has not only always been there when needed but has been over the years an invaluable technical adviser. It was Rodney and myself that came up with the concept of the first and very successful web site, which he hosted at the imps address, he ran the original site almost single handed as well as his own ever growing computer business, serving the local business community.

What exactly happens when the Ghostbusters are called out?

We are continuously contacted by members of the general public and the media through either Robin's private telephone number or the website, wanting help or just advice. So firstly, we have to establish if what is happening to the person is either physical or psychological.

During his degree Robin also became involved in group therapy and studied the works of Freud, Jung and other psychoanalytical masters. This, in turn, led him to study counselling - and he believes that this has given him considerable insight into the problems of others. He has devoted more than twenty years to researching the paranormal, and the background knowledge gained during his degree, comes into play when we are trying to determine whether there are genuine physical effects being felt in a situation, or whether there is a psychological cause which may need the attention of a psychologist or a psychiatrist, rather than a parapsychological investigator.

To give an example, GBUK went to see one very nice man in our preliminary investigations, and noticed that his house smelt very strongly of what we thought was disinfectant. 'What's been going on?' we asked, he appeared lucid enough at first and said he was being physically attacked by disembodied entities.

Now, we know that this is not an unknown phenomenon, so we were quite prepared on meeting to accept his story, as you have to start somewhere.

But we were soon to be disillusioned, for he suddenly shouted: 'Look, there's one now! There it is! I'll get it!'

Then he got out a giant can of fly spray and started squirting it around. 'There! That's got it!' he cried, and leaned towards Robin confidentially saying. 'I get them like that, you know.' He had cans of fly spray in his house, in his car - everywhere!

He was obviously hallucinating. It was clearly a psychological case, and the team beat a hasty retreat and escaped to the nearest pub, for medicinal brandy, before he turned his can of fly-spray on them! Later Robin spoke to a nearby relative who seemed fully aware of this poor man's problem.

We always try to search for a logical solution first. As a team we research the paranormal out of interest and try to help the people concerned, who are often very worried and frightened, to understand what maybe going on. Some people think we're eccentrics, but we're not particularly concerned about what people think, they can believe what they like. Most of the team have experienced unaccountable paranormal phenomena over the years, it can happen suddenly and without warning, usually before you have time to set up recording devices or video. The paranormal can surprise you when you least expect it, either at night or during the day, and no matter how long you have done this sort of research it can still freak you out and send cold shivers down your spine. But whatever and whenever strange anomalies occur it can be astonishing to the individuals concerned and can take an enormous amount of time to try to sort things out to everyone's satisfaction.

Unfortunately for the media, who are always keen to witness all things paranormal, it is very difficult to record poltergeist activity to order, or arrange a meeting with an apparition at midnight on any given day. We have all spent the witching hours waiting patiently for 'something' to go bump in the night – sometimes we get lucky, most of the time we get very cold and tired, but its worth all the agony for that one special 'something'!!!!!

There may be a rational explanation for all paranormal events, but it may not yet be within our sphere of knowledge and understanding, and as Robin says at this present time, there appear to be more questions than answers. As Plato said – "Do we see it because it's there, or conversely, is it there because we see it?"

One of Robin's favourite scholars of the eighteenth century is Dr Samuel Johnson. He was fascinated by magic, too - and he had something to say about the proof that scientists always demand. 'As to ghosts,' he declared, 'all proof's against it ... and all beliefs for it.'

A Politically-Restricted Pagan?

At first glance, the idea of a politically-restricted pagan doesn't look too bad – after all, pagans are known for their disinclination to 'organise' into anything constituting a recognisable political movement, as well as for their lack of affiliation to the main parties. In fact, involvement in main stream politics seems to be anathema to most. So, I thought political restriction wouldn't be a problem when I took a job as a policy advisor at the beginning of the year, a role in which I would be responsible for helping all councillors, regardless of political creed or colour. 'Not a problem', say I. I don't agree with most Labour policies, but I don't particularly like those of the Tories or Lib Dems either – I could be fair in my dislike of all parties.

But this is where the problems with this theory started. I began to wonder, as the local council elections drew closer, whether I could be equally unfair to all parties. What were to happen if, as with a neighbouring council, the public in their wisdom elected a member of the BNP? Could I ethically undertake some research on the appropriateness of 'white power'? Would I turn into the Albert Speer of the Council – state that I was just following orders as I condemned my fellow (wo)men, whilst secretly burning committee papers and silencing the harsher recommendations? An extreme example, yes, but a very real one.

And then there's the reality that, at ground level, everything is political - even bins have become a national, politically-charged issue. The drive to make the public greener, and to respect the world in which we live, is council led. Planning, and the politics involved in that, has caused a stir for more than one council, particularly amongst pagans. It was Kennet District Council and their members, who made it so difficult to visit Avebury on solstice; while in my own council my hands are tied in campaigning against the building of a road which will cut through my favourite ritual space, as well as through tracts of ancient woodland, sites of special scientific interest, an important iron age hill fort, and a conservation area.

So here's the rub – most pagans will claim that they are apolitical yet ethical creatures. My question is, where does one stop and the other start? It is no longer just war, tax, and the great machinations of state which count as politics (although these each have their separate philosophical dimensions), but those which used to be posed as ethical questions - the responsibility of the individual, the role of the community, and the rights of everyone in society. Granted, these may be couched in political jargon - CIC (the Commission for Integration and Cohesion) is a resoundingly uninspiring name - but at their heart, they are concerned with what drives so many of us. Should pagans, then, take Mithras by the horns (so to speak) and claim loudly 'Yes! I am interested in politics!'. Perhaps not. As John Whiteside Parsons put it 'when there is too much organisation we depart'. But it is only when you see the nitty-gritty of politics, and the ethical dilemmas behind it, that you realise even though you're not tied in to a political party, it is impossible to escape or to avoid holding a political opinion. Whether it is equally impossible to keep silent in the face of so much temptation remains to be seen.

Oastcakes or Hopkins

Ingredients

40z wholemeal flour 40z plain white flour

(Alternatively - if wholemeal doesn't take your fancy, simply use 8oz plain white flour)

1 teaspoon baking powder 20z lard or butter 2 oz currants 4 tablespoons water 7 fl oz white wine or parsnip wine pinch of mixed spices (cinnamon, nutmeg - whatever you like really) Sunflower oil Caster sugar for dusting

Method

Place flour and baking powder into a bowl and rub in 1/2 the fat. Add the currants and the spices.

Beat in the water and enough of the wine to make a soft batter-like dough.

In a frying pan, melt the rest of the fat and add sunflower oil to the depth of about 1/2cm. Drop in tablespoons of the dough and spread them out with a spatula. Fry until golden on both sides.

Remove from pan and place on kitchen roll to absorb excess oil, then immediately dredge with caster sugar. Eat when hot if possible, or cover in foil and keep warm in a low-heated oven. Can be kept for a few days in an airtight container and re-warmed in a low-heat oven for a few minutes.

Spicy Lentil Soup courtesy of Stilly

Ingredients (Serves 4)

115g red lentils
2tsp vegetable Oil
1 large onion, finely chopped
2 garlic cloves, crushed
1 tsp ground cumin
1 tsp ground coriander
1 tsp garam masala
2 tbsp tomato puree or ketchup
1 lt Veggie stock
350g can sweet corn, drained
salt & pepper

To Serve

natural yogurt chopped fresh parsley warmed pita bread

Rain's Soup courtesy of Rainbowleigh

In a blender :

1 large (2 smaller) red onions. You can use white or spring or shallots

2 red peppers, you can use other colours but it will make the colour of the soup mucky and the green ones are a bit harsh ,you can also roast them for another flavour 2 celery sticks de-stringed

- 2 cans of tomatoes or passata
- 1 tbsp of coriander seeds
- 1 tsp of cumin seeds
- 1 tbsp sugar, I use brown as I like the taste better
- salt and pepper Juice and zest of 1 lemon and lime if you have it

As much chilli dry or fresh as you like

Garlic, again to taste, I love the stuff but that is up to you

1. Rinse the red lentils thoroughly under cold water and leave to drain.

2. Heat the oil and fry the onion and garlic until softened but not brown.

3. Stir in the cumin, coriander, masala and tomato puree and 4 tbl spoons of the stock. Mix well and simmer for 2 mins.

4. Add the lentils and the remainder of the stock. Bring to the boil, reduce the heat & simmer for 1 hour or until the lentils are tender and the soup thickened. Stir in the sweet corn and heat through for 5 mins. Season to taste.

5. Ladle into warmed soup bowls and top with yogurt and parsley. Serve with warm pita bread or fresh chunky wholemeal bread.

1. Put all the ingrediants in to a large saucepan and cook (simmer) for about 20 minutes.

2. When the vegetables are soft blend together and add some water to make it thinner or leave it thick and heat through.

3. Sprinkle some Parmesan onto the finished soup and maybe a dash of Worcestershire sauce and some good extra virgin olive oil.

4. You can also add home made croutons:

Just cut some dry bread into squares and toss with some oil (try herb/garlic oil) put on a baking sheet and into an oven at 190° C but watch them they do burn. You can also try them in a skillet on the stove top

Or how about cheesy garlic bread:

Cut the bread into slices,(this works well with baguette or ciabatta) and rub some fresh garlic into the dry bread and top with cheese, grill till done.. OR you can make your own garlic butter.

Sloe Gin courtesy of Stilly

Ingredients

450g/1lb sloes (best after the first frost) 225g/80z caster sugar 1 litre/1³/4 pint gin

Method

1. Prick the tough skin of the sloes all over with a clean needle and put in a large sterilised jar or Demijohn.

2. Pour in the sugar and the gin, seal tightly and shake well.

3. Store in a cool, dark cupboard and shake every other day for a week. Then shake once a week for two months.

4. The sloe gin will now be a beautiful dark red and ready to drink, although it will still improve with keeping.

5. Variation: make blackberry brandy in the same way, substituting blackberries for the sloes and brandy for the gin. Blackberries do not need pricking. You can also use Damsons in Gin or Vodka.



Welcome To The Pumpkin Patch

Well, hello all and welcome to Old Butternut Squash's Pumpkin Patch. I hope you will stay a while; it looks like you need to take the weight off your feet. Let me just pop the kettle on and we can have a quick chat about what we need to do this autumn to keep our plots ticking over.

Mmm, where shall we start me dears, well I suppose the soil wouldn't be a bad idea. Now if you have really heavy soil now is the time to get it dug over so that the frosts can break it down over winter, mind you incorporate plenty of manure or compost as this will help break up the fine clay particles and provide much needed nutrients for your soil. Another tip is to lime the soil, this will bind the particles of clay together through a process called flocculation (do not lime the soil until at least 6 weeks after manuring as it will cause a chemical reaction) this should result in a lovely well nourished soil come spring. One word of warning, do not lime the ground more than 1 year in 3 as it can alter the soils PH quite substantially. It also helps if you are growing Brassicas as these like a nice alkaline soil and it also helps prevent club root, which is rather nasty and means you won't be able to grow cabbages, caulis and the such for quite a few years.

Now if you have a nice light soil don't dig it yet but add plenty of manure or compost and leave it on the surface this will stop your soil from being blown away and the structure being damaged and can be dug in, in Spring.

Crops, oh yes there are plenty of crops that can be planted now if you look over there to that bed I only planted Garlic and Onions the other day.

Now lets see, Garlic is best planted now as it needs a cold snap to spark it into life also Japanese Onions and over-wintering Onion sets need to be planted now as well. For garlic make sure the bed is well prepared and plant the cloves at 4 inch intervals at a depth of about 3 inches. For Onion these need planting at 5 inch intervals at about 1 inch depth. If you are troubled with birds place a piece of netting over them to stop them being pulled up.

You can also plant early cropping peas and broad beans, varieties for these I would suggest are Feltham First for peas and Aquadulcia Claudia for broad beans. The peas need to be sown in shallow drills 2 cm deep in double rows about 4 inches apart and each double row at least 18 inches apart. Broad beans need to be planted about 6 inches apart and about 2 inches deep with rows at leas 2 feet apart, these varieties will take a couple of degrees of frost but will need covering up with a cloche if there is prolonged cold weather. Planting these now means you will have a crop in April or May and will also miss pea moth that can be a bit of a problem especially in southern areas.

You could plant carrots in a trough and place them in a greenhouse or conservatory and you could have fresh carrots for Yule. I would suggest a variety such as Early Nantes 2 as they are quite short and quick maturing. Fill a small trough with a multi-purpose compost and sow quite shallow, water well and enjoy. Make sure you don't let them dry out as they will split.

You could also plant winter lettuce and radish. Spanish Black radishes will see you through the winter but these need to be planted out side as they do grow quite large and lettuce will give you some greens right through to January Ohh, nearly forgot, sweet peas you can start these off now if you put 2-3 seeds in a 3 inch pot filled with seed compost and place in a warm room until they have germinated. Then move them to a cold frame or unheated greenhouse, where they will over winter. When they are 3-4 inches high pinch out the growing tips this will produce stronger bushier plants for planting out in early to mid April.

Ah you want some other jobs, my, you really want to be busy, well if you have a greenhouse don't forget to wash it down and tidy up the inside this will keep pests down and ensure that things are ready for after Yule. Cut down your rhubarb and give it a feeding of manure this will ensure the crowns receive a nice dose of frost to help promote new growth next year. Also your asparagus will need cutting down, make sure you leave 2 inches protruding as this will help guard against asparagus beetle next spring when you cut the remaining 2 inches to ground level.

Don't forget to clean and oil any tools that will be left standing over winter, a bucket with some sharp sand and some oil in it makes a wonderful cleaner for spades and forks. Also make sure any power tools are well serviced and cleaned for next year. Remove any unused petrol from mowers and strimmers and change the oil if necessary.

You could also plant a number of herbs in a pot or container for over wintering on the kitchen windowsill, herbs like parsley, coriander, and basil will all happily grow on the windowsill and give that added bit of zing to any dish.

One thing we must do is look after our little friends, if you have any rubbish piled up don't move it now until spring as hedgehogs and grass snakes will be starting to hibernate, make sure there is a pile of logs for beetles and other insects to hide in. Also make a bunch of bamboo cut in to 6-8 inch lengths and tied with a bit of string, hang this in a sheltered spot and it will provide a roost for lacewings and ladybirds both of which eat aphids. Also our feathered friends need our help, apples placed on the ground will attract Blackbirds, and fat balls will attract a large variety of birds and gives them a much needed hit of high energy. The usual nuts and seeds will provide all round nutrients for a wide range of birds and mealy worms for robins and a variety of other birds including starlings.

Ole' Butternuts tips and tricks:

Save old toilet roll inners – These make great biodegradable pots for beans, peas and sweetcorn.

Don't flush it away – Your wee is a wonderful natural accelerant for your compost heap.

4 pallets will make an ideal compost bin – make sure they are well staked down and one is left as a door and any builder will normally let you take them away.

Save Your Seed – Save seed from flowers it saves a fortune in seeds and you never know you might breed your own variant.

A Quiet Death

I'm not a morbid person; I came to terms with my own mortality years ago. Although I am not looking forward to dying, the actual moment of lost consciousness with its ebbing spark holds no terror for me. I haven't had many experiences with death, although I'm nearing the middle (likely) of my lifetime. The few experiences I have had have been pretty gruesome. My father's father passed on after a seven year decline, losing his mind and then his physical control to Parkinson's. My step-father's father died from lung cancer. My mother's father is dying of what seems to be old age, but he's losing touch and interest in the world and his wife is slowly bending into herself, crippled by arthritis.

The trigger for this introspective moment is my step-mother, who is on her deathbed as I write. Dolores was a tiny, vital, fierce, energetic woman who took care of herself and lived a very good life. She didn't smoke or take drugs, drank in moderation, ate the organic food she prepared with love, and enjoyed life to its fullest. Despite this, just after her 58th birthday she was diagnosed with colon cancer. She underwent an intensive course of chemo and radiation treatments that sapped her strength, but not her will, through the summer.

She was beginning to turnaround, to regain her strength and ability to eat once again a few months ago and we all began to, cautiously, hope. (For those of you who haven't experienced cancer directly, you don't hope until months have gone by after the last treatment, and you don't release your fear until years of `clean' tests have come back.) Then she noticed a tremor in her left arm, and an inability to flex her hands. An MRI revealed lesions on the brain. Essentially, cancer had invaded her brain.

Dolores is claustrophobic, and the treatment for this new cancer was to encase her head in a mask that briefly emitted radiation. It was never for more than 10 minutes, but she spent the daily sessions battling a terror so fierce it left her depleted and worn. And then the poison from the radiation began to take its toll. Unable to eat, losing strength daily, Dolores finally asked the question her doctors had hoped she wouldn't need to ask: is this treatment palliative or curative, was it holding the cancer at bay, or actually making it retreat? It was palliative, there was no cure for what had happened to her, only a chance that further damage might be prevented and her pain eased. Facing a life of ongoing terror and physical depletion, Dolores decided to stop further treatments.

She hoped that she might be able to start eating again, regain some weight and strength. She knew that she just needed a break and she could get on top of this illness. Her energy was low, but her spirit remained strong. Once again, the Universe had other plans for her. It has been fifteen days since she last ingested any sustenance, although she has been drinking water. The hospice care began last week, with kind-soul'd caretakers arriving daily to help my father take care of the woman he has loved, fiercely for more than 25 years now. She will never leave this home while alive, and I wonder what my father will do with it when she has gone.

My full moon wish of the Goddess was Dolores to be able to release life, having learned all that she can at this time, quickly. I know my wish was heard, and granted. Her's is a quiet death. No media will cover her passing, no agonizing moral decisions will arise from this event, and the lives of strangers will not be changed. Dolores, when she dies, will be one of the 155,000 who die that day. Like the Goddess, I do not fear Death, knowing I can learn a great deal from it. Dying, however, terrifies me. It is a place where my faith breaks down, where fear interferes and pushes me away from my divinity. I want absolutes, I want promises, and I want proof that when my time comes it will be gentle, painless, and swift. It must be a good death. Dolores, in many ways, will have a good death. She is in her beloved home, her husband at her side, with her clearly stated (documented and witnessed) wishes carried out without question. The hard part is for those of us who continue to live. For us it is not a good death. It is too soon, too fast, too quiet.

Knowing me as She does, Mother only holds me and Her Lover. I spend my anger pounding on His chest, accusing Him of taking the ones I love away, but He doesn't mind. Eventually, I feel loss, but my knowledge needs no bolstering. Death is a stopping point, terrible for the still-living, but (often) a relief to the departed.

"She never got a break," we cry. "It isn't fair," we wail – as if we never learned that life, by definition, isn't fair. Our heads know it, but our hearts refuse to listen. Turning my head into the comfort of the Mother, I weep for the loss. The loss of a bright, beautiful, opinionated, frustrating, intelligent, out-spoken, daring, warm woman who made my father very happy. She challenged him, pushed his limits and stood up to him. And he loved – loves – her. He told me he misses his wife, because the woman he sleeps next to at night is no longer that person, it's a shell, a faded image of what once was, like a sepia photograph left in the sun for too long.

The Crone merely points to a mirror on the wall, the Sage standing by Her side. I turn to look and see myself holding blooded daggers, a necklace of fresh skulls draping across my chest. Before I can see any more, I change into armor, a huge raven on my shoulder. Another blink and the left side of my body withers and pulls from my bones while the right grows smooth and young. She has no answers for me, I hold the answers within myself.

Samhain nears, and the old year will end as the new begins. The flesh has been harvested, and we are preparing for the long winter ahead. This year I will have a new name to add to the roll of my Honored Dead, a fresh stick of incense to light, and another candle to add to my altar.


This year I will spend part of the night doing what I can to manifest a good death for myself. I'll be writing my funeral, documenting my final wishes, and making out my will.



Spirit Roads

Book Review By David Raven

Publisher: Collins & Brown Cost: £6.99 (Amazon)

First impressions tell me that I should like this book. It has standing stones on the front after all, and it's by Paul Devereux; an author well-respected in the Earth Mysteries field, and one who's written several books that I've enjoyed reading in the past. The blurb on the back cover informs me that 'after reading this book, the scenery once taken for granted on country rambles and picnics in quiet, open fields will never seem the same again'. Proclaiming to be a 'practical guide' that 'provides an intriguingly original way of exploring the landscape', I'm finding my expectations from this 200-page paperback very high! Opening it up, I wonder if I'm ready for such 'paradigm shifting' and revelatory reading.

The book, a republication of a 2003 original entitled 'Fairy Paths and Death Roads', is divided into two parts. The first consists of a seventy-seven-page overview of the different types of 'otherworldly route'. The reader is treated to an exploration of folklore and mythic tales from various countries and periods in history. From the aboriginal song-lines of Australia, via a considerable amount of information concerning the Fairy Paths of Ireland, to the British 'Corpse Roads', Devereux pulls together a variety of evidence and uncovers a recurring theme. Using diverse sources including anecdote, first-hand accounts and academic studies, he highlights a common core of spirit beliefs concerning these paths that can be found across the continents of Europe, Asia and the Americas. For instance, he believes that the corpse roads of England, although created in medieval times, have attracted a body of much older lore that seems to stem from ancient shamanic traditions.

When I first heard the title "Thoughtful Pagan Living", I was expecting with some dread, a tome of a book that would take me days, if not weeks to read through! However, I was pleasantly pleased to receive a book of only 96 pages and 5 chapters. Upon opening the book, to my surprise and disappointment, I discovered that the contents page doesn't have any page numbers, thereby leaving me to flick through the book in order to locate a particular chapter.

The author Liz Pilley aims with this book and her previous book, Solitary Eclectic Witchcraft, to get the reader to think for themselves about the path they choose. She writes in a down to earth kind of style that is easy to read.

Although this book is aimed at both beginners and those experienced witches and pagans, I feel the first chapter regarding labels would be more beneficial to the beginner starting out on their path, and I imagine many experienced witches and paI did occasionally find myself wondering if some of the links he uses to support his ideas were rather tenuous, but I still enjoyed his occasional flights of fancy and conjecture!

The larger second part, around 120 pages, comprises a worldwide list of such 'ritual roads', a sampler from across the globe with the purpose of using actual examples of sites to illustrate the theories and ideas discussed in the first part. It's not intended to be a field guide, but more to show how the various cultures and people had a way of populating the topographical landscape simultaneously with a spiritual one.

The few examples in northern England did inspire me to get out the maps and search out other 'corpse roads' in my local region.

I'm sure some of the information the book contains will be old-hat to some pagan stalwarts, but I would unreservedly recommend this title to a new generation of Earth Mysteries researchers. There were enough snippets of folklore that I was personally either unaware of, or had forgotten, that I frequently found my train of thought going off at a tangent. I love it when a book can make you stare into the middle-distance, pondering the 'what-if...?'.

The book could have been a little more concise; there were parts where I had the impression he was padding out the text a little.

There are plenty of interesting black & white photographs to compliment the text, although some are of slightly dubious quality.

The references and notes contain plenty of sources for further reading.

In all, I found the book enjoyable and at times enlightening. It contains much that will be of interest to Witchtower readers.

gans would probably skip this chapter. The author gives a clear concise explanation of why people feel the need to use labels to describe themselves and how certain labels have negative connotations as well as attempting to answer some of the age old questions such as "am I really a witch?" or "how will I know if I am a pagan?".

In chapter 3 the author briefly describes several other religions from her own viewpoint and how elements of these religions can relate to paganism. In further chapters the author goes on to explain about magic and how magic is in all our lives whether we chose to recognise it or not. She gives a brief explanation about Alchemy and goes on to talk about the risks and finding a balance when choosing to use magic in your life. She certainly doesn't enforce the fact that you must use magic to be a witch or pagan - its optional!

Each chapter contains an exercise with the aim of helping you think more deeply about yourself and your place in the pagan world.

Overall, the author of this book, aims to encourage you to think things through instead of blindly accepting what you are told is "correct" and following a path that might not feel right to you. She encourages you to constantly reassess what you believe and she helps you understand that it's okay to doubt yourself from time to time.d



Get to Know Your Editor

Why did I become a Pagan? Do you know I'm not sure I ever "became" a pagan, it is something that I have always been/felt ever since I was a kid.
